Rules: A) Plant material must dominate, B) Plant materials do not need to be grown by the exhibitor, C) The novice class is for exhibitors who have not won three or more firsts in any class, D) Anyone can exhibit in the general section.

Please keep exhibits to a reasonable size and provide a water source which will last the show. Be mindful of water leaks.

1st, 2nd and 3rd place are awarded in all classes. A champion is awarded for the novice section. Both champion and reserve champion are awarded in the general section due to the extra classes.

A separate prize will be awarded for the best use of daffodils and camelias in any of the Floral Art Classes.



Notes For Exhibitors

All entries in daffodil classes other than the novice class, are encouraged to have the daffodil name or seedling number of the bloom along with the Division and colour code

NND = Not Necessarily Different

Judges can award champions from any section of the show. In any class where there are numerous entries, Judges will sub-divide the class at their discretion

Miniature Daffodils: The international standard for a miniature daffodil is less than 50 mm diameter. A miniature daffodil is a flower named on the ADS approved miniature list or one the judges consider suitable for inclusion as a miniature. All miniatures in classes other than the novice class are encouraged to have the daffodil name or seedling number and colour code. E.g. 'Hawera' 5y-y

Intermediate Daffodils: An intermediate daffodil has a diameter of 50mm to 80mm (Named blooms must be shown according to the size at which they are registered)

Divisions 1,2,3,4 & 11 only

Rules for Standard and Miniature Sections

Seedling Daffodils must be bred by the exhibitor and not yet named for commercial sale.

Amateur / Small Growers is for growers who do not have a daffodil sales list

Restricted and Novice section champions must move up to the next class after having won 3 champions in their section at previous shows
